GENERAL INFORMATION

What Bible Educational Services does: -

Bible Educational Services (BES UK) publish "Bibletime", "New Life" and "Gleaners" Bible lessons in English and support Postal Bible Schools and similar organizations using BES lessons in the UK and overseas, by visiting, networking, advising and training. BES is also currently working in partnership with groups in other countries who are involved in translation, design, publishing, and distribution of lessons. Lessons must be provided free of charge to all students.

Bibletime lessons were first used in Southern Ireland over 60 years ago. Bible Educational Services maintain editorial responsibility for Bibletime Lessons in English and in all foreign languages. Bibletime lessons have been normally published in an A4 format which enables students in some areas, every four weeks, to send the lessons back to a Postal Bible School Centre for marking. More recently, thanks to Every Home Crusade (Revival Movement) in Belfast, lessons for six months have been published in an A5 format, which has made usage in churches and schools overseas much easier, especially where there is no effective postal system.

The BES lessons are unique in that they are prepared with home or group (church/school) study in view, following a planned syllabus which allows students to continue studying for up to 20 years. Five levels of lessons are available for specific age groups, Pre-school (Level 0), 5-7's (Level 1), 8-10's (Level 2), 11-13's (Level 3), 14-16's (Level 4). There is a three-year syllabus for each age group. (See page 4) The age groups can be varied according to ability. The Bibletime Resource gives children the opportunity of studying God's Word, learning Bible Stories, and facing the challenge of the relevance of the Gospel in their lives.

Printed copies of the lessons are available in English from the BES website – www.besweb.com or from the International Secretary. They are also available on the website in other languages. BES has documents which may be helpful to those who are considering partnering with BES, and these are also available on the website.

TEACHER GUIDELINES

Originally, Bibletime lessons were produced to be used in a postal system with a Postal Bible School Centre but the lessons are increasingly being used where the postal system is unreliable or non-existent especially in churches and schools in Africa, India and other locations. Teacher Guidelines are produced for those using Bibletime lessons in such situations. The Teacher Guidelines in this booklet are designed for use with Level 3 and 4 lessons approximate ages 11-14+.

Each Guideline follows the same Bible Reference as the Bibletime lesson. The Bibletime lessons and Guidelines are designed to be used on a weekly basis. The April lessons are especially related to Easter and the December lessons to Christmas.

Some locations will be using an A4 monthly edition with 4 lessons and others will be using the A5 booklet with 24 lessons included. Normally the teacher or leader will give out the monthly A4 lesson and each week the lesson will be either filled in, in the church or school or taken home and returned the following week. At the end of the month the teacher or leader will collect the lesson and do the necessary marking, returning the marked lessons as soon as possible to the student.

Ideally, when using the booklets, they are collected and marked at the end of each session. We realise that in many situations this is impossible. In the classroom they may be distributed to other students and the teacher or leader will work through the lessons and the students will mark their friend's lessons and give them a score. At the back of the booklets there is a place for scores for each month's lesson and a place for a comment about progress that the student has made. There is also a certificate that can be detached and given to the student with an indication of the percentage obtained for the six months of lessons.

PREPARATION FOR TEACHERS

The Teacher Guidelines are not prescriptive and giving no room for teachers to adapt things in their own way with their own ideas and initiatives. These are suggestions which could help in the use of Bibletime.

- **Be familiar with the story** - Teachers should be as familiar as possible with the Bible story and with the Bibletime lesson that accompanies it. Ideally, the Bibletime lesson should be completed by the teacher before the lesson. The Guidelines for each lesson should also be carefully considered as a planning aid for the lessons.
- **Understand the lessons to be learned** - At the top of each lesson plan are the words "We are learning that", followed by two learning intentions which the children will hopefully have grasped after listening to the teacher's presentation and completing the Bibletime lesson. The first learning intention is to do with knowledge about the story, whereas the second encourages the children to think about the knowledge, apply it and make a response. These learning intentions are a precise statement of the main concepts/truth taught in the lesson and teachers may wish to use them for their personal evaluation of the teaching and learning which has occurred.
- **Introduce it** - All lessons start "where the children are" with their own experience of a situation. Various ways have been suggested that might be used to enable the children to be interactive in discussing the starting point of the story.
- **Teach It** - The Key Points of the story are given. Hopefully, teachers would not have to refer to these when actually telling the story but would be familiar with the story and be able to teach it in an interesting and inspiring way. The teacher will want the children to understand the main lessons from the story and help them to understand the response they can make from the story. As appropriate we have tried to interweave some explanations into the story telling. These are always included in *ITALICS*.
- **Learn It** - There is a Key Verse attached to each story. On some occasions, there are two Key Verses, since we have added another Key Verse which may be easier for children to learn. We hope that the children can learn the Key Verses and will be reminded of it as often as possible so that they begin to build up knowledge of Key Bible Verses.
- **Complete It** - In a school situation the teacher will be aware of the abilities of children to complete worksheets and the amount of teacher support required. For some, it will be a requirement that the teacher reads over the text of the lesson as the children follow what is now a familiar narrative. Other children may be

able to read the text independently. In either case, it may be an idea to draw the children's attention to specific instructions relating to the questions. If Bibletime is used in a non-school context, it is important that teachers are available to help so that the lesson is not perceived as a chore or test. It should be enjoyable; encouragement and praise while working on the task are important.

- **Remember it** - Wherever possible, quizzes, acting etc. are suggested to assist the learning, and as a means of revising the story.
- **Show it** - In some situations, visuals will be very difficult to obtain but wherever possible it is important to focus on pictures or objects to help in the understanding of the story. Visual aids can be a great help in telling the stories. Where appropriate in each lesson we have given the information about pictures from www.freebibleimages.org pictures (FBI) which can be downloaded from their website. At the end of the Teacher Guidelines there are some Appendices with hyperlinks to a variety of different Free Bible Images suitable for each story.
- Where a photocopier is available some Bibletime pictures could be enlarged, coloured, and used in teaching.

Time Plan

- **Order.** There is the same order in the Teacher Guidelines for each Lesson, but it may be the teachers will want to change this from time to time.
 - The introduction and telling the story - approximately 15 minutes
 - Teaching the Key Verse – 5-10 minutes
 - Completing the worksheet - 20 minutes
 - Quiz and other activities 5-10 minutes.

Remember the important saying:

“Tell me and I may forget,
Show me and I will remember,
Involve me and I'll understand.”

	<p>Bible Focus: <i>Genesis 41: 46-57 and 42: 1-38</i></p> <p>Key Verse: <i>Numbers 32: 23</i></p> <p>We are learning that:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. We cannot sin and get away with it. 2. We must acknowledge our sin before we can appreciate the forgiveness that only the Lord Jesus can give. 	<p>Bible Focus: <i>Genesis 39: 1-23 and 40: 1-23</i></p> <p>Key Verse: <i>Genesis 39: 21</i></p> <p>We are learning that:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Joseph did not give into temptation. 2. The Lord was with Joseph in slavery, temptation, and imprisonment. Joseph trusted and obeyed the Lord.
INTRODUCE IT	<p>Explain to students that the Egyptians relied on their own crops for food and seven years of famine was a very serious situation for the people. Corn was valuable in those days as it was used in everything for food and could be stored for a long time. It was even used as money. Explain that Egypt was usually much better off in times of famine than the neighbouring countries because of the River Nile.</p>	<p>Remind the students of the story so far from B6. Now Joseph is in Egypt, but his troubles are not over. God is allowing him to go through some difficult situations, so that he is ready to face challenges in the future. Remind students that God sometimes tests us by allowing us to go through trials which can make us much stronger to face the future.</p>
COMPLETE IT	<p>Present the Bible Story</p> <p>Discuss and Explain:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The famine lasts for seven years (<i>verse 54</i>) and Joseph is the only one who can supply the need (<i>verse 55</i>) out of the abundant supplies of corn in Pharaoh's storehouses. 2. Joseph's brothers had to come down to Egypt looking for corn because of the famine. (<i>42: 1-3</i>) 3. Joseph recognised his brothers, but they did not know him. (<i>42: 7</i>) He put them in prison for three days. 4. Joseph dealt with his brothers in such a way that they would acknowledge how they had sinned against him. (<i>42: 21</i>) Only then will he forgive them. 5. Their memories and consciences convince them of their guilt, and they understand the reason for the distress they are experiencing. 6. In spite of their sin, Joseph weeps for them (<i>verse 24</i>) and gives them food for their return journey to their father Jacob, but he keeps Simeon in prison and demands that Benjamin, the youngest son should be brought down to Egypt. 7. Jacob is very upset when they tell him all that has happened and says he will never let Benjamin go down to Egypt. (<i>42: 38</i>) <p>Explain the Key Verse and encourage students to learn it. Complete Lesson 1. Show it: see FBI links in Appendix A – Spies in Egypt.</p>	<p>Present the Bible Story</p> <p>Discuss and Explain:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Joseph made the best of his situation as a slave in Egypt and soon earned Potiphar's trust. (<i>39: 2</i>) 2. Pharaoh's wife falsely accused Joseph of assaulting her and had him imprisoned. (<i>39: 11-20</i>) However, Joseph was a young man of integrity who continued to rely and trust in God, no matter the situation and God prospered him by turning this situation around and making Joseph the prison administrator. (<i>39: 21-23</i>) 3. Two of the inmates in the prison had dreams and Joseph was able to interpret them. (<i>40: 8</i>) 4. The interpretation by Joseph of the chief butler's dream was a message of life in that he was freed from prison, but the interpretation of the baker's dream was a message of death in that the chief baker was executed. 5. Joseph asked the cupbearer to remember him and seek Pharaoh's help when he was released but he forgot all about Joseph. REVIEW IT	<p>Discuss with students how the Key Verse summarises the lesson.</p>	<p>Discuss with students how the Key Verse summarises the lesson regarding:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Joseph's life in Potiphar's household; and 2. Joseph's life in prison.
LIVE IT	<p>How does the lesson challenge us?</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Note the importance of turning our backs on sin and turning to the Lord Jesus for His forgiveness. 2. The importance of understanding 1 John 1: 9: 'If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.' 3. Note the A, B, C, of Salvation - A- Admit you have sinned. B- Believe that the Lord Jesus died for us on the cross. C- Confess that Jesus is Lord of your life. 	<p>How does the lesson challenge us?</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. We need to not give in to temptation but to ask the Lord every day to help us overcome it. 2. The secret of being an effective witness for the Lord is to recognise opportunities where we can relate the Lord Jesus to the other person's experience, in an effort to win him/her for the Saviour. 3. Look at Suggested Further Readings, Ephesians 6: 13-17 and James 1: 12-18, and consider how we can overcome temptation in our lives.

Judah, who joined his brothers in selling Joseph into slavery, now offers to become a slave himself to save Benjamin. (44: 33) 2. God can work on hard-hearted people and cause a complete change in their lives. 	<p>Bible Focus: <i>Genesis 41: 1-45</i></p> <p>Key Verse: <i>Genesis 41: 38</i></p> <p>We are learning that:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Joseph rose quickly to the top – from being a slave to being the Prime Minister of Egypt. Whatever situations we find ourselves in, we should consider them as part of a training programme which God has for our lives. 2. Just as Pharaoh recognised Joseph was 'a man in whom the Spirit of God is' (41: 38), so those who know you should be able to see God in you, by your kind acts and godly manner of life.
INTRODUCE IT	<p>Discuss with students how the sin of Joseph's brothers not only brought distress upon themselves but brought great heartbreak to their father Jacob. Explain how sin can have a serious impact on our family and friends, as well as ourselves.</p>	<p>Joseph was called from the prison to appear before Pharaoh. Joseph's God-given ability to tell Pharaoh all about his dream impressed Pharaoh so much that he gave Joseph the high office of 'Prime Minister'. (Genesis 41: 41) Joseph was faithful to God through the difficult circumstances (Study 1) and God was faithful to him.</p>
COMPLETE IT	<p>Present the Bible Story</p> <p>Discuss and Explain:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The famine continues and the brothers return again to Egypt for food. Jacob is very reluctant to let Benjamin go to Egypt. (43: 11-13) Only Joseph could satisfy their need and meet their distress. 2. The brothers are all invited to Joseph's house for a meal, and still they do not recognise him. (43: 16) 3. The fearful brothers enjoy the feast provided by Joseph at his palace. Joseph cries when he sees his younger brother Benjamin. (43: 30) 4. He orders his silver cup to be put in Benjamin's sack and claims that Benjamin has stolen it and he must be punished. (44: 17) 5. All this time, Joseph is testing and assessing if his brothers are ready for the pardon, he is about to give them. <p>Explain the Key Verse and encourage students to learn it. Complete Lesson 2. Show it: FBI – see FBI links in Appendix A – Benjamin and bad news!</p>	<p>Present the Bible Story</p> <p>Discuss and Explain:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The magicians and wise men were unable to interpret Pharaoh's dreams, but God had revealed the meaning to Joseph. (41: 8) 2. Joseph's knowledge of God helped him interpret the dream and again he gives the credit to God. (41: 16) 3. Joseph gave Pharaoh a survival plan for the seven years of famine which saved many lives in Egypt and those of his own family many miles away. (41: 33-36) 4. Joseph is exalted and made ruler over the land of Egypt. He was given a new name and given a daughter of a prominent Egyptian official for his wife, to show how highly he was honoured. (41: 41-45) <p>Explain the Key Verse and encourage students to learn it. Complete Study 2. Show it: see FBI links in Appendix A – His palace promotion.</p>
REVIEW IT	<p>Explain to the students that:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. There is an emptiness in our lives until we confess our sins and come to the 'spiritual Joseph', the Lord Jesus, for forgiveness. 2. A feast of blessing awaits those who are forgiven, especially a future in Heaven. 	<p>Ask students questions about (i) the dreams, (ii) its interpretations, and (iii) Joseph's promotion which will help them to answer the questions correctly in Study 2.</p>
LIVE IT	<p>How does the lesson challenge us?</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Consider that sin causes distress. 2. When we repent and confess our sins the Lord Jesus is ready to pardon and forgive. 3. When the Lord Jesus pardons us then we should pardon those who sin against us. (Ephesians 4: 32) 	<p>How does the lesson challenge us?</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Just as Joseph was ready for almost anything because of his right relationship with God, so we should learn from his example. If we are Christians, prayer and Bible Study are vital to finding God's will and direction for our lives. 2. Read the Suggested Further Readings and find out what the Psalmist David & Apostle Paul said about Joseph many years after his death and apply these readings to our own lives. Psalm 105: 16-22 and Acts 7: 9-10 3. Joseph was always careful to give God the credit and we should be careful to do the same. Taking honour for ourselves is stealing God's honour.

	Bible Focus: <i>Genesis 44: 18-34; 45: 1-14, 25-28</i> Key Verse: <i>Genesis 45: 9</i> We are learning that: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Although Joseph's brothers wanted to get rid of him, God used their evil actions to preserve their lives, save Egypt and prepare the way for the beginning of the nation of Israel. Just as Joseph was rejected and later forgave his brothers, God forgives us and blesses us even though we have rejected Him. 	Bible Focus: <i>Genesis 42 and 43</i> Key Verses: <i>Romans 14: 11-12</i> We are learning that: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Joseph's brothers must be brought to see and admit their sin before they could be forgiven. Just as Joseph's brothers bowed down in submission to him, so every one of us will bow down before the Lord Jesus Christ in a coming day and acknowledge him as Lord.
INTRODUCE IT	<p>When Joseph saw that his brothers were truly sorry, he revealed who he was to them and said: <i>"I am Joseph."</i> (<i>Genesis 45: 4</i>) Discuss with students how the 'heavenly Joseph, our Lord Jesus Christ', also referred to Himself as the 'I am' in the following: <i>John 6: 35 - bread of life; John 8: 12 - light of the world; John 10: 7 - door; John 10: 11 - good shepherd; John 11: 25 - resurrection and the life; John 14: 6 - the way; John 15: 1 - the vine.</i></p>	<p>The last time Joseph saw his brothers, about twenty years earlier, they sold him to the Midianite slave traders for twenty pieces of silver. Joseph must have been wondering if they were still as evil and treacherous or had they changed over the years. He decided to put them through a few tests to find out!</p>
COMPLETE IT	<p>Present the Bible Story</p> <p>Discuss and Explain:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> The silver cup was a symbol of Joseph's authority and to steal it would be a serious crime. Now the brothers were worried that Benjamin might be harmed so on their return to Joseph's palace, Judah steps forward to take Benjamin's punishment. (<i>44: 33</i>) Instead of facing punishment the brothers received forgiveness (<i>45: 5</i>) and Joseph explains to them how God was working out His purposes in his own life, despite what they had done. The brothers return to Jacob with the good news that Joseph is alive and showing him the presents sent by Joseph. (<i>45: 26-27</i>) <p>Explain the Key Verse and encourage students to learn it.</p> <p>Complete Lesson 3.</p> <p>Show it: see FBI links in Appendix A – Forgiveness and good news!</p>	<p>Present the Bible Story</p> <p>Discuss and Explain:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Joseph's brothers come to Egypt in their need to buy corn. Joseph speaks 'roughly' to them which indicated he is going to bring them to acknowledge their sin before they can be forgiven. (<i>42: 6-7</i>) Joseph put them in prison for three days. In their consciences they knew they had sinned against Joseph and so they admitted their guilt. (<i>42: 21</i>) Although Joseph disciplines his brothers, he does so in love for we are told in <i>Genesis 42: 24</i> that he wept. Here we see true grace in action as Joseph goes on to show love to his brothers that they did not deserve. On their second visit to Joseph, bringing Benjamin with them, the brothers bow in reverence before him and acknowledge his authority. (<i>43: 26-28</i>) Here we see Joseph's dream, in <i>Genesis 37: 7</i> becoming a reality. This shows us God's Word is inspired and true! Joseph is very moved when at last he sees his brother Benjamin and goes into another room and cries. (<i>43: 30</i>) <p>Explain the Key Verses and encourage students to learn them.</p> <p>Complete Study 3.</p> <p>Show it: see FBI links in Appendix A – His caring conduct.</p>
REVIEW IT	<p>Connect this lesson with the Key Verse: <i>"God hath made me lord of all Egypt!"</i> and <i>"Come down unto me and tarry not."</i> Discuss with students Jacob's reaction of delight to the two phrases. (<i>45: 9</i>)</p>	<p>Learn the two Key Verses and discuss with students how they are a summary of this lesson.</p>
LIVE IT	<p>How does the lesson challenge us?</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> The importance of knowing the Lord Jesus is alive in Heaven, and is Lord of all, just as Joseph was alive in Egypt and ruler overall. The importance of understanding the Lord Jesus will not only forgive but give us blessings in abundance when we trust in Him. Again, reminding students of the need for us to follow God's example of forgiveness by forgiving others, as the Lord Jesus taught in His prayer for the disciples. (<i>Matthew 6: 12</i>) 	<p>How does the lesson challenge us?</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> What do we learn about the grace the Lord Jesus gives in <i>Romans 5: 21?</i> Just as Joseph showed love to his brothers who wronged him, we see a far greater love displayed by the Lord Jesus when He died for sinners like us on Calvary. Read <i>Luke 23: 34</i> and think it over. Joseph's dream in <i>Genesis 37: 7-8</i> became reality in <i>Genesis 43: 26</i>. Read the Suggested Further Readings, <i>Psalms 51</i> and <i>Philippians 2: 9-11</i> and think about how these readings also emphasise the need to confess our sin and the need to acknowledge that 'Jesus Christ is Lord.'

Think about how excited they would have been to be free from slavery! 2. God guided the Israelites by a pillar of cloud in the day and a pillar of fire at night. (13: 21-22) This showed them that He was always with them and was guiding them. <i>Often, we wish that we had physical signs that God is with us today. But He can guide us and help us through the Bible and through the Holy Spirit.</i> 3. When Pharaoh's army started chasing the Israelites, the Israelites panicked and complained that God wasn't looking after them. They didn't trust Him. (14: 10-11) They had completely forgotten how God had already helped them and had brought them so far. <i>Explain that often we can have this attitude when things go wrong in our lives.</i> 4. Moses remained calm and positive in the situation, reminding the people that God would fight for them. (14: 14) 5. God demonstrated His mighty power in splitting the Red Sea so that the Israelites could pass and then destroying the Egyptian army in the sea once the Israelites had reached the other side. (14: 21-22, 26-28) 6. The Israelites feared the Lord and trusted Him and trusted Moses too as their leader. (14: 31) <p>Explain the Key Verse and encourage students to learn it. Complete Lesson 2. Show it: see FBI links in Appendix B – The Red Sea.</p>	<p>Present the Bible Story</p> <p>Discuss and Explain:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. It has been two months since God brought the Israelites out of Egypt. He now prepares them for what is to come. (19: 1) 2. God tells Moses to tell the people how they are His chosen people and how they will be His treasured possession. (19: 5-6) He tells them to consecrate themselves. <i>Explain what consecrate means – set apart, getting them physically and spiritually ready to meet God.</i> 3. The Israelites could not even touch the mountain because it was holy. God's power and holiness were so strong that the people could not come near Him. (19: 10-13) <i>Consider how amazing it is that we can now approach this holy, powerful God with freedom because of all that the Lord Jesus has done.</i> 4. God allows only Moses to approach Him and gives Him the Ten Commandments. (20: 1-17) These laws tell the people of Israel's responsibilities to God and to each other. They were given to lead Israel to a life of practical holiness and for them to see the nature of God and a plan for how to live their lives. 5. The people were afraid and unwilling to go up the mountain themselves, so Moses acted as the mediator between them and God. Their fear was terror. Moses wanted to replace this with the fear of the Lord which brings trust and obedience and keeps them from sinning. REVIEW IT	Create a comic strip of this story; God guiding the Israelites, the Israelites realising the Egyptians are chasing them and then how God saves them. Their problems are not over as the Amalekites attack them! But God helped them. Moses stands at the top of a hill and holds the staff of God above his head. When it was above his head, they were winning, but when it was below his head, they were losing! The Israelites won the battle that day – God was clearly with them helping them defeat this enemy. This also showed that God would lead the people of Israel through Moses. Present the Bible Story Discuss and Explain: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The people of Israel got impatient waiting for Moses to come back down from Mount Sinai. They took matters into their own hands and wanted to make their own god. They replaced the Lord's leadership with a false idol that they could control. Think about how this was breaking the first two Commandments. (32: 1-4) 2. When God saw what was happening, He was ready to destroy the whole nation because of their disobedience (32: 10) but Moses pleaded with God not to do this. God shows mercy here. (32: 11-14) <i>Explain the definition of mercy (being spared from the punishment that is deserved).</i> 3. Moses went back down the mountain and was so angry with the people that he broke the stone Ten Commandments in front of them, to show them that they had broken God's laws. He should have known that what the people of Israel were doing was wrong but instead he listened to their complaints and helped them build this golden calf to worship. (32: 21-22) 5. The Israelites have been in the desert now for almost 40 years and were getting frustrated. They began to complain again to God – “Why have you taken us out of Egypt to die here?!” (<i>Numbers 21: 4</i>) 2. So, God gets angry with their lack of trust in Him. He sends poisonous snakes among them and many died. But Moses prayed to God on behalf of the people for forgiveness. (<i>21: 7</i>) 3. God told Moses to make a bronze snake on a pole and anyone who looked at this snake was healed. The bronze snake made it possible for the Israelites to be cured. By looking at it, the Israelites were acknowledging that this judgement was from God and that only God could deliver them from it. (<i>21: 9</i>) 4. The Israelites did not know this yet but this snake on the staff had a bigger meaning. In <i>John 3</i>, Jesus explains how just as the Israelites were healed by looking at this snake, so also today we can be healed from our sin by looking to Jesus’ death when He was lifted up on the cross. It was not the snake that healed the Israelites but their faith that could heal them. <p>Explain the Key Verses and encourage students to learn it. Complete Lesson 4. Show it: see FBI links in Appendix B – The bronze snake.</p>	<p>Present the Bible Story</p> <p>Discuss and Explain:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The Israelites had been wandering in the desert for almost 40 years and were getting impatient. God had promised them the Promised Land, but it was nowhere to be seen yet. So, they complained and grumbled to God about their situation, instead of remembering how far God had brought them. (<i>Numbers 21: 4-6</i>) 2. Before this, they had been in many situations of danger, but the Lord had provided for them and was there for them, despite their lack of faith and continued complaining. 3. But the Lord had had enough and sent poisonous snakes, which bit the people, and many died. (<i>21: 6</i>) 4. The people soon realised their sin and asked Moses to ask God for forgiveness. (<i>21: 7</i>) 5. So, God instructed the bronze snake to be put up on a pole and those who looked on it would live. By looking at this snake, they acknowledged that God had sent this judgement and only God could take it away and save them. (<i>21: 9</i>) 6. The people of Israel did not realise it, but this was a symbol of the Lord Jesus on the cross. Those who looked to the snake were freed from their pain and did not die. In the same way, those who look to the Lord Jesus on the cross and trust in Him will not die but will have eternal life. REVIEW IT	Ask the students to look at the well-known verse, <i>John 3: 16</i> and to consider the meaning of eternal life. Guidance for Teachers Marking Lessons

Level 3 lessons

- The students cannot complete these lessons without referring to the Bible and may have to refer to one or more Bible Readings.
- Questions are in various forms including cross words and word grids, missing words, etc.
- They have been particularly designed to be answered by the NIV, Good News, RSV New King James, Authorised Version and Common English Bible versions.
- Our aim is that all students, whatever Bible they possess, will be able to answer the questions.
- Twenty marks are allocated for each week with a maximum of 80 for the month, when the lessons are completely correct.
- Level 3 - Usually 1 mark per answer required, as indicated.

Level 4 Studies

- These are a harder edition to Level 3 lessons.
- More complex questions and answers required.
- Twenty marks per week and 80 for the month, when the lessons are completely correct, and the questions have a full answer.

MARKING HINTS

The teachers are asked, first to:

- Check through each lesson and mark the answers correct or incorrect.
- Award the necessary points as instructed.
- Always mark in a contrasting colour and TICK each correct answer.
- Put in the correct answer, where necessary and correct any spelling errors, though NO marks are deducted for these.
- Give fewer marks for partially correct answers.
- Add the total for the month and write this on the back page in the space provided.

It is necessary to be generous and to do everything possible to encourage the students with their Bible Study. It is helpful, where possible each month for the teacher to write a word of encouragement to the student and there is a space provided on the lesson sheet for this to be done. Comments can be made about good colouring, neatness, marks attained, the student's understanding of the lesson, etc.

We try to keep comments as varied as possible. Questions, statements, observations, encouragements, etc. can all be used to maintain variety. It requires thought, but it is important to keep the interest of the student alive. If the same statement or question is being repeated every month, it loses its impact.

LEVEL 3

General comments

"Great work! You obviously read the questions very carefully. I especially liked your answer to the last question which was very well worded."

"Hi Jonathan. Thank you for all your hard work. It was great that you managed nearly all the answers. I have filled in the missing one's for you."

Spiritual comments

"Moses had some difficult times with the children of Israel, but God didn't leave him to sort out all the problems by himself."

"Joseph never forgot that his father had taught him to love God. He remembered this even when he was far away from home."

"Bartimaeus was determined to get to the Lord Jesus. He wasn't disappointed for he was now able to see and he now knew the Lord Jesus was someone really special."

LEVEL 4

General comments

"Another excellent set of lessons. You seem to have a good grasp of these Bible stories and I really hope you have enjoyed them. Thank you for taking the time to do the lessons carefully. It would be easy to rush through them, so I appreciate all your effort."

"A very good try, Rachel. I think by your answers, you may not fully have understood the story. Perhaps you could try reading it through again."

Spiritual comments

"Parables are sometimes called earthly stories with heavenly, or deeper, meaning. Can you think what the deeper meaning is in the parable in study 3?"

"Stephen died a cruel death and yet he was not afraid to die, for he knew that God was still in control and he knew he would be with the Lord Jesus in Heaven."
